By attending an in-state college or university, you can save money while earning a high-quality education.

New Jersey's Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) is here to help you in your college search with financial aid products and services such as need-based grants and merit scholarship programs, the NJBEST College Savings Plan, the NJCLASS supplemental family loan program, and financial literacy counseling. Since 1959, HESAA has assisted approximately five million students with more than \$18 billion in funds to make college more affordable.

In New Jersey, students have access to a variety of postsecondary institutions, including twoyear community colleges, four-year colleges and universities, and career schools. These institutions provide highly diversified programs of study to meet the individual needs of students as they prepare for future careers.

TWO-YEAR COLLEGES

Two-year colleges offer students the opportunity to earn an associate degree, including the Associate in Arts, the Associate in Science and the Associate in Applied Science. Your education at a two-year school can provide you with specialized training that can be immediately applied to a job following graduation. It can also prepare you for transfer to a four-year institution where you can complete your bachelor's degree.

New Jersey's county and community colleges primarily serve the residents of their respective county. In most instances, students enroll in the institution that serves their county. However, if you live in a county without a community college, or if your college doesn't offer the program you want, you can attend one of the other community colleges.

FOUR-YEAR COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

New Jersey's four-year colleges and universities grant a bachelor's degree, which is also called a baccalaureate. A few offer an associate, and most have graduate degree programs. Four-year colleges and universities generally offer a broad curriculum, unless the school specializes in a certain area of study, such as music.

Graduates typically receive a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of

Science degree. Some New Jersey colleges offer degrees with specialized titles such as a Bachelor of Science in Engineering or a Bachelor of Fine Arts.

TRANSFERRING FROM A TWO-YEAR SCHOOL

The New Jersey Presidents' Council approved the Comprehensive State-Wide Transfer Agreement. Under the provisions of this agreement, an Associate of Arts (AA) or Associate of Science (AS) degree from a New Jersey community college will be fully transferable as the first two years of a baccalaureate degree program and will be considered to have completed all lower division general education requirements. CAREER SCHOOLS

Career schools train students for a specific vocation. Programs of study are usually, but not always, shorter in duration than traditional colleges — ranging from six months to one year. Programs range from automotive repair to culinary arts, from electronics to paralegal, from gaming and design to health care. Career schools can also serve as a stepping stone to entry into a two-year or four-year degree program.



The New Jersey College Promise offers an affordable pathway to a college degree.

Together, the Community College Opportunity Grant (CCOG) and the Garden State Guarantee (GSG) programs promise transparent, predictable pricing for up to four years of college here in New Jersey.

Based on your income, your degree may be free!



Community College Opportunity Grants make community colleges affordable for New Jerseyans. CCOG awards pay for the cost of tuition and approved educational fees for New Jersey residents with an annual adjusted gross income (AGI) between \$0 and \$65,000. New Jersey

residents with AGIs between \$65,001 and \$80,000 pay reduced tuition costs after up to 50% of the maximum CCOG award available at their community college is applied. The CCOG covers the cost of tuition and fees that are not already covered by federal and state financial aid or scholarships.

To be eligible for a Community College Opportunity Grant, students must:

- ⊗ Be a New Jersey resident with an AGI between \$0 \$80,000
- Ocomplete the FAFSA or NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application by applicable state deadlines
- Enroll in at least six (6) credits per semester at one of New Jersey's community colleges



New Jersey residents who attend a New Jersey four-year public institution of higher education and have an annual AGI between \$0 and \$65,000 will attend tuition-free during their third (60-89 credits) and fourth (90-126 credits) years of study, because the Garden State Guarantee

provides a net price of \$0 for tuition and fees during those years. Students who have AGIs between \$65,001 and \$80,000 will pay a discounted net price of no more than \$7,500 for tuition and fees per year during their third and fourth years at one of New Jersey's four-year public colleges or universities. The GSG covers the cost of tuition and fees that are not already covered by federal and state financial aid or scholarships.

To be eligible for the Garden State Guarantee, students must:

- ☑ Be a New Jersey resident with an AGI between \$0 \$80,000
- Complete the FAFSA or NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application by applicable state deadlines
- Enroll full-time (at least 12 credits per semester) at a New Jersey public four-year college or university
- Have not yet earned a Bachelor's degree
- Make satisfactory academic progress

How to Apply

You will automatically be considered for CCOG and GSG when you complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or, if you qualify as a NJ Dreamer, the NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application.

New Jersey College Affordability Act

Expands NJ BEST 529 College Savings Benefits

To make college more affordable for New Jersey's working families, in June 2021 Governor Murphy signed the New Jersey College Affordability Act.

This new law encourages savings toward future college costs, provides tax relief for those paying tuition, and assists with the repayment of NJCLASS loans.

Starting with the 2022 tax year, families with a gross income of \$200,000 or less can claim tax deductions

on their New Jersey income taxes for contributions to the tuition costs at New Jersey colleges and universities, payments toward NJCLASS family loans, and NJBEST 529 College Savings Plan.

• Tuition Costs at New Jersey Higher Education Institutions

Up to \$10,000 in tuition paid for any New Jersey tax filer, their spouse, or their dependent who enrolls in and attends a New Jersey institution of higher education, can be deducted on a taxpayer's New Jersey income tax return.

Principal and Interest Paid on NJCLASS Family Loans

Up to \$2,500 in payments toward the principal and interest on New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students (NJCLASS) is also deductible.

• Contributions to a New Jersey Better Educational Savings Trust (NJBEST)

Up to \$10,000 of contributions to an NJBEST 529 College Savings account are now deductible from New Jersey state income taxes.

The College Affordability Act also created a valuable new benefit to further encourage college savings. Eligible New Jersey families funding a new NJBEST account can receive dollar-for-dollar matching grants to boost their savings. This one-time grant matches up to \$750 of the initial investment into a new NJBEST account opened as of June 2021 by an account owner with a household adjusted gross income between \$0 and \$75,000. A new NJBEST



529 College Savings account can be opened with as little as \$25.

When NJBEST account beneficiaries go on to enroll at a New Jersey college or university, they can apply for a one-time scholarship. In 2021, HESAA updated its regulations to double the amount of the NJBEST scholarship, up to \$3,000 for eligible student beneficiaries of a NJBEST account that received contributions of at least \$300 per year for at least four years.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY FUND

WHAT IS THE EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY FUND (EOF)? The New Jersey Educational

Opportunity Fund (EOF) was created by law in 1968 to ensure meaningful supportive access to higher education for New Jersey residents to attend one of the Fund's participating colleges or universities. EOF is a campus-based program and admission into EOF is conducted at the campus level.

WHAT DOES EOF PROVIDE? EOF focuses on student success as measured by academic achievement, retention, persistence, graduation, and career preparation. In addition to providing eligible students who are admitted into the program with financial aid support, EOF also provides:

- 1. College Summer Bridge Program
- $2.\ \,$ Various forms of student support services (i.e., academic advisement, counseling, tutoring, etc.)
- 3. The ability to participate in leadership development activities
- 4. Other educational initiatives that assist students to succeed in their majors, career fields, and prepares them for the changing world.

HOW DO I APPLY?

- 1. Students must apply and be accepted to a New Jersey college or university that participates in the Fund.
- Students must file a FAFSA or NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application (for NJ Dreamers). This information is available through high schools, colleges, or by calling the HESAA Customer Care number at 800-792-8670.

The FAFSA is also available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

- 3. Contact the EOF Director There is an EOF campus director at every institution participating in the Fund. Each college/university has its own specific criteria for EOF admission and program participation. Due to the limited number of available spaces, students should contact the EOF director at the institution they wish to attend for more information. EOF UNDERGRADUATE ELIGIBILITY:

- 1. Must demonstrate an educationally and economically disadvantaged background
- 2. Must be a New Jersey resident for 12 consecutive months prior to receiving the award
- 3. Must apply and be accepted to a participating New Jersey college or university
- 4. Must meet the academic criteria as set by the institution of choice
- $5. \ \, \text{Must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)} \\ \text{or the NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application} \\$

CHOOSING A COLLEGE

The process can be exciting, and the choice will greatly impact your future.

CHOOSING A COLLEGE IS AN EXCITING DECISION.

Since your final choice will greatly impact your future, you should take time to figure out what you expect to learn and gain from your college experience. First, consider yourself.

WHAT ARE YOUR GOALS AND INTERESTS?

What are your academic strengths and weaknesses? Then consider the school, including its academic characteristics, admissions policy, costs, student aid programs, programs of study, and student body. Determining what you want most and what a college can offer you will help you reach a decision about where to apply.

You can also NARROW DOWN YOUR CHOICES by attending college fairs, visiting college websites, reviewing college planning guides (found in the library and on the web), and taking campus tours. Your high school guidance counselor can advise you on college preparation, planning, and selection. You can also seek personal advice from friends and family.





PAYING for COLLEGE

Student financial aid is widely available in New Jersey, which ranks among the top states in the country in aid dollars available for full-time students. The Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) administers New Jersey's student aid programs.

If you receive aid from HESAA, you may still receive assistance from federal and institutional aid programs. Grants and scholarships are aid that does not have to be repaid. Student loans must be paid back with interest.

When determining your financial aid options, it is important to work closely with a financial aid counselor at any institution you are interested in attending. Your financial aid counselor will review your eligibility for state, federal, and institutional assistance programs and prepare a financial aid package to help you meet the costs at that school.

Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or, if you qualify as an NJ Dreamer, the NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application.

TAG

New Jersey's Tuition Aid Grant (TAG) program is one of the nation's most generous financial aid programs.

Depending on your need and the type of institution you attend, a TAG award can cover up to the full cost of tuition or a portion of that cost. One in every three full-time New Jersey students receives TAG, and awards may be used at nearly all New Jersey postsecondary institutions, including county colleges, state colleges, and eligible private colleges and universities.

To get the best idea of a family's ability to pay higher education expenses, eligibility for TAG is determined by a review of a number of factors, such as family income and assets, family size, and the number of household members in college.

In New Jersey, aid for exceptionally needy students is also available through



Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) grants.

How to apply. To apply for State aid, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application if you qualify as an NJ Dreamer (application for those whose immigration status makes them ineligible to complete the FAFSA).

STATE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS

New Jersey's merit-based scholarships recognize academic excellence while encouraging students to continue their education at in-state colleges and universities.

HESAA also administers several special scholarship programs which benefit children of emergency service personnel and law enforcement officers who have been killed in the line of duty.

GUS

The Governor's Urban Scholarship provides merit-based scholarships of \$1,000 to students who live in an economically-challenged community in New Jersey, and who achieve a class rank in the top 5.0% of their class and have a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher at the end of the junior year of high school.

NJ STARS

The New Jersey Student Tuition Assistance Reward Scholarship (NJ STARS) Program provides New Jersey's highest achieving students with free tuition at their home county college. New Jersey residents who rank in the top 15.0% of their class at the end of either junior or senior year of high school may be eligible to receive an NJ STARS award for attendance at their home county college. The NJ STARS award covers the cost of tuition, less any state and/or federal grants and scholarships, for up to 18 credit hours per semester. Students identified as potential NJ STARS scholars must achieve the required score on a college placement test to demonstrate readiness for college-level coursework prior to receiving a scholarship. If remediation is required, the student has one year from September 1 following high school graduation to demonstrate college readiness.

NJ STARS II

Successful NJ STARS scholars may be eligible for NJ STARS II, a program that provides funding to pursue a bachelor's degree to students who earn an associate degree from a county college and attain a cumulative GPA of 3.25 or higher.

STUDENT LOANS

Millions of students nationwide, including those who receive grants and scholarships, borrow student loans to help pay for their education.

There are two primary types of student loans: federal and supplemental. Federal student loans offer fixed interest rates and favorable terms, including the option to defer repayment until you have completed your degree. Federal loans include the Direct Loan for students, the Federal PLUS loan for parents, and the Federal PLUS loan for graduate and professional students.



Effective January 1, 2020, all FFELP loans once guaranteed by HESAA, transferred to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). KHEAA can be reached at (800) 928-4241.

Students may borrow Direct Loans regardless of financial need; however, those with need may receive a subsidized loan. With a subsidized loan, the federal government will pay the interest that accumulates on the loan while you are enrolled in college, for a short period after you graduate (grace period), and during periods of authorized deferment. For unsubsidized Direct Loans and Federal PLUS loans, interest is the responsibility of the borrower. See www.studentloans.gov.

HESAA makes supplemental loans available through the NJCLASS program, after the student has exhausted eligibility for all other forms of financial aid and federal Direct Loans. NJCLASS supplemental family loans offer low interest rates to borrowers meeting both income and credit worthiness requirements.

NJCLASS can be used to pay a portion of the tuition or the entire cost of college. New Jersey residents can use NJCLASS to attend any approved college in the nation. Non-New Jersey residents attending a New Jersey college can also use NJCLASS.

BORROW WISELY

College costs are rising, and more students are turning to loans to pay for educational expenses. Borrowing may be a necessity, but students are advised to borrow as little as possible. Borrowing should be a last resort after all student aid is exhausted. Student loans can help you achieve your educational goals, but don't over borrow. A good guideline is to limit your student loan borrowing to what your future earnings will allow you to repay. For tools and resources for understanding student loans, visit

Create your user ID and Password by going to https://fsaid.ed.gov and create an FSA ID. The student and parent will need to create their own FSA ID at this website. The student will use their login to access the FAFSA at www.studentaid.gov, the parent will use their ID to sign the FAFSA.

STEP 4

COMPLETE YOUR FAFSA

To start your FAFSA go to www.fafsa.gov. The student will login with their FSA ID. Use IRS Data Retrieval Tool (DRT) to complete your FAFSA! If you are unable to use DRT, you will need to collect your 2021 tax returns and other records of income. NJ Dreamers must complete the NJ Alternative Application only. To complete your application go to hesaa.org/Pages/NJAlternativeApplication.aspx

STEPS TO APPLY FOR FEDERAL AND STATE STUDENT AID

STEP 5

YOUR FAFSA RESULTS

The U.S. Department of Education will send you your Student Aid Report (SAR) – the result of processing your FAFSA. Review your SAR, and if necessary, make changes or corrections and submit your SAR for reprocessing. You can submit corrections online at www.studentaid.gov. Your complete, corrected SAR will contain your Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which determines your federal student aid eligibility.

STEP 6

YOUR NJ STATE AID RESULTS

HESAA will send an email to the email address listed on the FAFSA, which will contain your NJ State/HESAA ID. You will be instructed to create a NJFAMS User ID and password to log into your NJFAMS Student Portal. You can find your "To Do List" and "Award and Eligibility" information as well as other functions to assist you with your State aid process.

STEP 7

VERIFY YOUR ANSWERS

If you are selected for federal verification, your school's financial aid office will ask you to submit tax returns and other documents, as appropriate. Be sure to meet the school's deadlines. (To request an IRS tax return transcript go to www.irs.gov-iit's free) The State of New Jersey may also request documents to verify information reported on the FAFSA. HESAA will ask you to submit a tax return transcript and other documents as appropriate.

STEP 8

GET AWARD QUESTIONS ANSWERED

All Students: Contact the financial aid office if you have any questions about the aid being offered.

First-Time Applicants: Review financial aid shopping sheets from schools to compare amounts and types of aid being offered. Decide which school to attend based on a combination of (a) how well the school fits your needs and (b) its affordability after all aid is taken into account.



The New Jersey Alternative Financial Aid Application allows New Jersey Dreamers enrolled in eligible New Jersey colleges and universities to apply for state financial aid.

WHO SHOULD COMPLETE THIS APPLICATION?

Complete this application if you are NOT a United States citizen or eligible noncitizen and you meet all of the following criteria:

- Attended a New Jersey high school for at least three (3) years
- Graduated from a New Jersey high school or received the equivalent of a high school diploma in New Jersey
- Are able to file an affidavit stating that you have filed an application to legalize your immigration status or will file an application as soon you are eligible to do so.

You may also consult one of New Jersey's Licensed Budget and Credit Counseling Agencies found on the New Jersey Department of Banking and Insurance website. If you are experiencing problems, call your lender or HESAA right away to find out what options are available to you.
